Traffic Petition Coming

The PLDCA Traffic Committee has been in discussions with Saanich Police, the Engineering Department, and some Councillors, about the concerns of the area residents over the high rate of speed used by the majority of drivers. Approximately 97% of the traffic originates outside the Prospect Lake community. We have expressed our concerns about the obvious lack of safety on the narrow, poor-visibility roads in our area. **The common response from all those who have been approached is "Give us a petition".** So the time has come for everyone in the area to make their voice heard. We hope to have the petition ready by the beginning of August, if not sooner. We need as close to 100% response as possible so Saanich Council will sit up and take notice.

Please participate.

We are suggesting that the already "recommended" speed of 30kph that is posted on Prospect Lake Rd. and Goward Rd. be made an official speed. The Police department are unable/unwilling to enforce the speed limit unless the perpetrator is exceeding the limit by at least 10kph. This means, **at present, drivers are able to go 60kph, and many do.** By lowering the official limit to 30kph this will at least allow the police to keep the speed to under 40kph. Our survey showed that most of the respondents wanted this lowered speed limit to be applied to the whole area, that is, Prospect Lake Rd., Goward Rd., and Sparton Rd.

We are also considering asking for speed tables (a longer version of a speed hump) to be installed on either side of the school zone at Prospect Lake Elementary School. Other areas of concern could be added to the list. If you want a speed table in your area, or don't want one, please let us know as soon as possible. We are drafting a petition now, to be ready for circulation in the next two to three weeks. We also need volunteers to go door-to-door with the petition. If you can spare some time to canvass even as few as 10 of your neighbours, it would be of tremendous assistance.

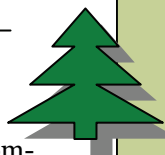

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Volunteer Lake Monitoring The Secchi Disk Program

About four years ago the PLDCA joined the B.C. Lake Stewardship Society, which has its headquarters in Kelowna. One of the programs administered by the Society is the B.C. Volunteer Lake Monitoring Program. Although this program may involve a number of different levels of testing, it usually starts with the Secchi Disk program, which is what we have been doing. Probably many of you have never heard of a secchi disk – I know I never had before becoming involved in testing.

The typical secchi disk used in lakes is an 8 inch disk with alternating black and white quadrants. It is lowered into the water until the observer can no longer see it. The depth of disappearance, called the secchi depth, is a measure of the transparency of the water. Transparency decreases as the amount of particulate materials – such as algae and suspended sediment – increases. The amount of algae that grows is affected by the amount of nutrients coming from sewage treatment plants, septic tanks, and lawn and agricultural fertilizer, as well as suspended sediments washed from construction sites, agricultural fields, urban storm runoff, or churned upward from bottom deposits.

With the information gathered under this program, combined with testing that the Ministry of Environment has done in the past, it is hoped that a lake specific document can be prepared for Prospect Lake, when funds and personnel can be made available to do so. This should be a help in determining the best way that we can maintain or hopefully improve the health of Prospect Lake.

Regulations Governing Prospect Lake and Whitehead Park—hours

Water skiing, Section 250– on Prospect Lake, waters skiing, wake boarding and tubing is limited to between 10am and 1/2 hour before sunset.

There seems to be some confusion on this. Some think it's 1 hour, others think 1/2 hour. **Regs state 1/2 hour.**

Growing Concern by Lake Residents Large wakes from boats causing foreshore erosion & residents concern.

Editor's note: this summer an increasing number of residents and lake users have contacted us with concern about unusually large wakes now appearing on Prospect Lake. Below is a sample of letters received.

Prospect Lake shoreline trees are at risk because the shoreline is being eroded from under them at a shocking rate by the half-meter tsunamis from large and tiny craft alike. Some operators are selfishly and deliberately adjusting their trim with propeller angle and/or ballast to cause deep stern penetration to form larger wakes for water sports, (specifically wakeboarding), but many are likely just ignorant about better trim increasing speed capability and fuel economy, while also dramatically reducing waves.

Recent winter storms have taken down an unprecedented number of shoreline trees weakened by irresponsible or ignorant behaviour. The soil around the roots of these precious trees has been washed away by unnatural causes.

Some boat operators brag loudly about how they have achieved maximum tsunami effect while I see the brown "soil soup" entering the water, but there are also small fishing craft that traverse the lake with the bow pointing at the sky, and the motor using much of its power just to make large waves instead of moving the boat forward. A simple engine or propeller tilt adjustment would solve the problem.

This summer I have been unable to enjoy the use of my dock in the late afternoon and early evening due to large wakes rocking it violently. What can be done about it?

Additional Solutions Boaters can consider

- Please do not use ballast to increase wake size.
 - Please do not speed outside the marker bouys.
 - Reduce speed close to shore.
 - Consider what size/type of boat is appropriate.
 - Bring power boats off the lake one hour before dusk.
 - Be aware the lake is shared with swimmers, kayakers, fishermen, and by children at play at the foreshore.
 - Wakes can be dangerous. Ensure to take care.

Boat Safety Certificate: In September boaters are required to have a safe boaters certificate. If you want information or help try safeboater.com or call 1-800-567-7767. We can expect some enforcement of this new requirement.

Tips on Boating Greener.

By now you have dusted off your boat, dewinterized (you did winterize right?) and have it in the water.

The primary issue on everyone's mind these days should be the preservation of our waterways and lakes. A well maintained engine is one way of helping. A qualified marine technician can check for fuel and oil leaks and running improperly due to flooding carburetors.

One method to cut down on excess oil on a two stroke engine is to get the correct oil/fuel ratio. Another method is to use a high quality oil such as Mercury's TCW3 Premium Plus. Correct mixing is important so a simple way to ensure the correct mixing is to use a measuring cup marked in ML's such as the one in your kitchen (remember not to use for cooking afterward). The correct ratio for a 50:1 mixture is 20ml of oil to each litre of fuel.

If your two stroke engine is getting long in the tooth and it's time to trade up to a 4 stroke you will cut your fuel consumption in half and eliminate the need to add lubricating oil to the fuel (much more environmentally friendly!). The ultimate environmentally friendly answer for your lake needs is the electric motors though you will be limited to the amount of thrust and distance you can travel.

At the end of summer remember to winterize your boat. This protects your investment and makes boating greener.

Prospect Lake Preservation Society Update

Lake Aerator. The PLPS in conjunction with the Prospect Lake Golf course has initiated a test of aeration technology on the lake to reduce nutrient load and eutrophication. You can see the new aerator fountain working away at the south end of the lake. We will use a secchi disk to monitor the progress of this multi year project. Several residents have already come forward asking how to add additional aerators. Stay posted for more activities soon.

Weed Harvester. Our last news letter featured the article on phosphates and water quality by Randy Storey. The long term solution to the algal-weed blooms is to reduce the nutrients in the lake. Randy described how we should avoid detergents and fertilizers which add phosphates to the ground water. In the short term the PLPS is looking to secure a weed harvester. This will enable us to remove the increasing volumes of weed enhancing the lake experience, and removing a nutrient load (dead weeds). Fewer weeds in the lake make swimming, boating and lake use more enjoyable. This is a big project, stay posted.

Signs for Lake Safety and Access. The PLPS is in a working group with Saanich staff and Saanich Police to develop a new set of improved information signs. These will help educate lake users on the recreational conduct appropriate for this mixed use of this small lake. The PLPS has raised \$4000 for this project.

Invasive Species. The health task force covers water quality and invasive species (weeds, willows, bullfrogs etc.). Information is being collected. Volunteers and funding is being sought to assist.

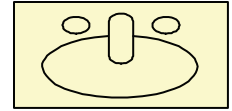
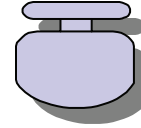
